PARAGRAPH STRUCTURE

Topic sentence: The first sentence of the paragraph that introduces the main idea.

Supporting sentences: They give details to develop and support the main idea of the paragraph.

This is where your concrete details and commentary go.

Concluding sentence: The last sentence of the paragraph that ties all of the ideas together.

CHUNKS

Concrete detail: Evidence from the text, usually in the form of a quote.

❖ Transition into the concrete detail (no "floating" quotes).

<u>Commentary</u>: Your thoughts or analysis about the evidence provided in the concrete detail.

- ❖ A writer uses commentary to make connections between the facts of the text and the claim he or she is making.
- Remember, you don't want any "floating" quotes. <u>Transition</u> into your quotes.
- For each concrete detail, provide at least two to three sentences of commentary that appropriately explain the <u>meaning</u> and <u>significance</u> of the concrete detail and how it relates to what you are trying to prove.
- <u>DON'T use phrases like "This quote shows..." in your commentary.</u> Instead, just start with whatever you would write after that phrase. Consider using words like: reveals, demonstrates, influences, impacts.
- <u>DON'T use the word "I"</u> in your writing.
